Bolton Woods Virtual Give it a Go Learning Programme will reduce social isolation, support people into work and build community cohesion in the Bolton Woods area of Bradford. They intend to bring together a diverse range of people who, despite their differences, face many of the same barriers to securing work and/or socialising with others. Adults with learning disabilities will work together with other groups in the community (single parents, members of local BAME communities, unemployed people, students and retired people) to coproduce a pilot programme of workshops and events that will develop skills, increase employment opportunities and strengthen community connections. The project will deliver education for life through ESOL classes. Alongside practical workshops like DIY which will include: putting up shelves, changing a light bulb, wiring a plug as well as basic plumbing, assembling flat packed furniture and re-upholstering second hand furniture. Parallel to DIY there will be classes in car maintenance and gardening. In car maintenance women will learn how to change a tyre, check the air pressure in their tyres, and oil in the engine. In the gardening classes the women will learn how to grown vegetables in their back yards despite limitation of space and resources, how to cultivate seeds and how to achieve a low carbon footprint. There will be one more stream, which will teach women how to set up a small business where they will learn how to do their own tax, keep accounts, and understand customer service.
